Sermon Questions for Reflection for the Week of June 8, 2025

Sermon Title: Spirit of Adoption

Sermon Scripture: Acts 2:1-21; Romans 8:14-17

Before you read the Scriptures and listen to the sermon for June 8, 2025, I invite you to do the following:

- Find a quiet place.
- Remove any distractions from your presence, including your cellphone.
- Light a candle. The lit candle designates a sacred place where Jesus Christ is present.
- Invite the Holy Spirit to be present and to help you to understand the Scripture readings and the sermon (John 14:26).
- Read the Scriptures slowly and listen to the sermon, deliberately. You can access

- 1. When you hear the name of the third person of the Trinity, Holy Spirit, what thoughts or impressions come to your mind?
- 2. Have you ever witnessed the presence and the power of the Holy Spirit in your life? In our congregation? In the larger community? If so, please describe the experience(s).
- 3. Where is the Holy Spirit leading you to make a difference? Where is the Holy Spirit calling our congregation to go in order to make a difference?

I encourage you to record new insights that you glean from reading Acts 2:1-21, Romans 8:14-17 and listening to Sunday's sermon. Take the time to reflect on these new insights and be in dialogue with the Holy Spirit about them.
